Slow travel to see the whales

This is a leisurely, comfortable and social way to travel, leaving plenty of time to take in the beautiful views of northern nature by the light of the midnight sun. What's more, it leaves a much smaller carbon footprint than flying - and can even be cheaper!

Experience a lot more with a little extra planning

Travelling via public transport is extremely rewarding, but it requires a little extra planning. You cannot book the whole trip on a single ticket, unlike with air travel. Our aim with this guide is to help you with the planning, and to make your decision to choose environmentally friendly travelling easier.

Getting on track: where to start with train travel

A good place to start is the Interrail/Eurail app, the closest you can come to a one-ticket solution covering most of Europe. Here you can plan your journey and even reserve tickets in-app.



Did you know, for example, that with just two convenient changes of train you can travel all the way from Berlin to Narvik (Northern Norway)? After a good night's sleep on the **Snälltåget** from Berlin to Stockholm, spend a day exploring the Swedish capital before hopping on the Norrland night train to Narvik. Or why not stay overnight Stockholm if you want more time? Once you're in the north, it's easy to continue your journey to Andenes either by taking a bus or renting an electric car.

Wake up in the Arctic Circle

There are two different night train routes to Northern Norway. Save money with a seat, or select a cosy private or shared sleeping cabin. Each train has a café and can be enjoyed as a social experience with others, or as a relaxed solo journey.

• Oslo-Trondheim-Bodø: Nordlandsbanen (10 hours) leaves from lively Trondheim through stunning mountainous landscapes, arriving morning in Bodø, European Capital of Culture 2024. To get to Trondheim take a <u>day or</u> <u>night train from Oslo (7.5</u> **hours)** which winds through the equally dazzling Dovrefjell national park, home to the iconic musk ox!



Stockholm-Narvik-Tromsø: the Norrland night train (19 hours) departs from Stockholm in the late afternoon. Wake up the next morning along the famous Arctic iron-ore railway, known for having some of the world's best views. Arrive in the Norwegian coastal town of Narvik, strategically important during WWII, around noon. Take a break here, or hop on the comfortable 4-hour bus (route 100) to Tromsø and beyond.









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Together in electric dreams

We understand the appeal of driving at your own pace along Norway's sweeping, quiet roads, many of which follow the coast.

Why not do this the Norwegian way and rent an electric vehicle (EV)? In 2023, 82.38% of new cars sold in Norway were EVs, so you won't be alone!

Recharging is usually cheaper than refuelling, and charging points are easily found at regular service stations. From compact cars to camper vans, it's easy to reduce carbon emissions and electrify your journey with an EV.



By fjord, lake and sea

Many smaller places in Norway are connected by water. 80 emissionsfree electric commuter ferries are operation throughout country, and many ferry routes in Northern Norway are free for cars and foot passengers alike.
